

Sunday School Summer Service Project

Paradise Sunday School's summer service project was a remarkable endeavor, assembling cake kits to donate to the B.R.A.N.C.H.H. food pantry in Big Run.

With the help of our amazing congregation, we were able to provide them with a total of 35 cake kits, a true testament to the power of community!

The kits included a disposable cake pan, cake mix, frosting, sprinkles, candles, balloons, and a can of soda to use in the cake mix in place of eggs, oil, and water. The kits were lovingly assembled by the kids during their class on July 20th, and completed with ribbons by the Sunday School teachers.

On July 22nd we delivered them to the First Christian Church in Big Run, where Robin McKee, who heads up the B.R.A.N.C.H.H. food pantry, was overjoyed! The kits will be a blessing to those in need during their August food distribution.

Robin gave us a little history of the upgrades made to their church basement, where the food pantry is based, and the growth of their food pantry. During the summer months, they see a drop in the number of people coming in, but in July, 36 people utilized the food pantry, a reminder that every contribution counts. In the colder months, that number will nearly double, highlighting the importance of continued support.

Robin shared that the program takes quite a bit of work, but it is now nearly selfsustaining, a shining example of faith in action. She had recently been feeling the weight of her commitment and was a bit discouraged - until she received our message out of the blue.

Despite moments of discouragement, God always provides, and our service project was a timely reminder of that promise.



A HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE PARADISE CHURCH

The Rev John Althouse was the first Reformed minister and perhaps the first minister of any Denomination to hold services by the Paradise community. He first preached in this locality in 1827 He fived near Punxsutawney and traveled widely throughout left erson Armstrong, Indiana and Clearfield Counties, the was allowed as a Reformed Circuit Rider. The Rukniey isometimes without Connely) bern was one of the frequent meeting places. This is the farm where Luther J. Difer lives today, and located about one half mile north of the present church.

A Congregation was organized of Reformed and Latheran people in 1833 or 1834.

A hewn tog church was built in 1842, called a Union Courch, at a place now known as Union Cemetery.

The early records are skimpy, but it seems that Rev. J. Ferdin, and Englbach served the churches of this area from 1845 to 1848, and Rev. Charles Henneman from 1848 to 1851. Rev. Brandt, of the Missouri Synod Lutheran was the pastor from 1851 to 1852.

Rev. Carl August Limberg, a 1854 graduate from Heidelberg Seminary, Tiffin, Ohio, came to serve the churches of the area, living in Punxsutawney. Apparently he had been in the area previous to this, for he had organized Trinity Reformed Church in Trout ville and along with the 43 male members had signed the constitution on October 23, 1853.

The Paradise Reformed Church was organized under Rev. Limberg's leadership in 1854. They continued to worship in the Union Church until the present church was erected in 1876. He served the Clearfield Charge (sometimes referred to as the Troutville Charge) until 1864. The Charge included four churches: Trinity at Troutville, Paradise, St. Peter's at Punxsutawney, and Little Round Top, later called St. John's. A parsonage was erected in Troutville in 1855 or 1856.

Rev. Limberg became the First Superintendent of the Orphans' Home in Butler, Pa., (now St. Paul Children's Home, Greensville, Pa.) October 10, 1867.

Sunday School was conducted in the Union Church composed of both Lutheran and Reformed people. However, due to the great distance a majority of the pupils lived from the church, it

seemed more convenient to hold Sunday School in the old Bonnett School House. This school was located below the present Paradise Church. There Sunday School, composed of both Lutheran and Reformed people, was held eight to ten years previous to their seperation about 1873.

The Lutheran people built their own church about 1873. Several years later the Reformed congregation did the same. The Cornerstone of the present building was laid in 1875 and the church, costing \$3000, was dedicated in August, 1876. The land was donated by Mr. Jonas Pifer.

Early in 1876, during the vacancy which followed Rev. Hoff-meier's pastorate, The Clarion Classis realigned the churches of the Charge. St. Peter's, Punxsutawney, and Little Round Top formed a new Charge, while Trinity and Paradise made up The Paradise Charge. Rev. John Wolbach became the pastor of the Paradise Charge June 1, 1876. The Paradise Church and Trinity Church maintained the parsonage in Troutville, buying out the shares held by St. Peter's and Little Round Top.

The first organ was purchased during the ministry of Rev. J. F.

Sunday School was conducted throughout the whole year in 1896 or 1897 for the first time. This was during the pastorate of Rev. J. P. Bachman. Previous to this, Sunday School was conducted during good weather, from May through September.

Under the leadership of Rev. S. C. Stover, the vestibule and steeple were added to the church in 1900 and the present parsonage was erected in 1901 for \$2157.31. A new Case Organ was purchased during this same period.

B. Catherine Pifer, a member of the congregation, went to Japan as a missionary in 1901. She served there for 40 years, returning just prior to World War II.

German sermons were discontinued with the coming of Rev. H. N. Smith in 1904. Prior to this one sermon every month was in German.

Rev. C. R. Hartman confirmed a large class of young people, perhaps the largest ever, having nine boys and eleven girls for a total of twenty. Monthly offering envelopes were used for the first in 1913. Previous to this all giving was by supscriptions: Under

the old system, all members were asked to subscribe (pledge) a stated amount for each individual need, including the pastor's

Rev. William H. Cogley was the first preacher to come in an automobile. A basement was put under the church and a furnace installed during his pastorate.

June 26, 1934 the Reformed Church in the United States and the Evangelical Synod of North America united to form the Evangelical and Reformed Church. Thus, the Paradise Church became a member of the new Denomination.

The first Vacation Bible School was held while Rev. A. H. K. Hoshauer was pastor. Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Reed presented the church with a Rosewood cased piano during this period.

The church records show that the Paradise Church has made many improvements, large and small, over the past years. The interior of the church was replastered and painted in 1938 and electric lights were installed in the sanctuary in 1939. This was during the pastorate of Rev. Alvin Master.

New Evangelical and Reformed Church Hymnals were purchased during the pastorate of Rev. Stanley Baker. A new furnace was installed in 1943. Hot and cold air pipes were added in 1945 and the blower fan was installed in 1946.

An outdoor sign identifying the church was put up in May, 1951. Indoor rest rooms and the present kitchen were installed under the vestibule in the summer of the same year.

The 75th Anniversary of the present edifice was held on Sunday, August 19, 1951. More than 600 persons were registered during the all day program. Rev. William H. Cogley and Rev. Adam Hoshauer, two former pastors, brought the messages at the morning and evening services respectively.

The iron hand railing at the front church steps was provided in 1952 by Sarah E. Wiant in memory of her father, Rev. Wiant.

Electric lights were installed in the basement and a new and bigger furnace installed, both in 1955.

June 25, 1957 we found ourselves a part of the great effort to make the divided church a United Church of Christ Jesus. The Evangelical and Reformed Church united with the Congregational Christian Churches to form The United Church of Christ. Once again the Paradise Church became a member of a new Denomination.

A well was drilled and an electric pump installed in the summer of 1938 to provide a more adequate water supply.

Miss Mollie Pifer gave a new Lowery electric organ in memory of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Pifer, and two brothers, James and Charles. It was dedicated at a special service August 24, 1958. Mrs. Paul Spotts and Mr. Carl Hollenbaugh gave an organ recital. The Sunday School purchased a new piano later that same year.

December 20, 1959 the congregation took the biggest step it had taken for a number of years. It approved an estimated \$11,000 remodeling project including new church furniture. The work was started on February 8, by Mr. Donald Reed, contractor. The work progressed rapidly and upon the installation of the new furniture, March 31 and April 1, the project was completed for approximately \$10,000. The members are to be commended for their wonderful response, both of time and money.

Thanks to the cooperate spirit and the generous response of all concerned, we are able to come here today to dedicate a beautiful and worshipful sanctuary and chancel. As we dedicate our remodeled church to the glory of God, let us dedicate ourselves anew that we might be led to even greater heights of worship and service.
