Next meeting will be January 8,2025 at 7:00 P.M.



B.R.A.N.C.H.H.

The North Fork Chapter 29 of the Pennsylvania Archeology Society, based in Brookville, PA. met at the home of Greg Peace on November 24 2024. Eight club members and one very interested local resident were present for a total of nine, one cool, overcast afternoon.

The purpose of our gathering was to view, evaluate and appreciate eight or so archeological and historic sites contained w/in our area.

At 1:30 our participants boarded into three vehicles; destination the Shepler/Tripony Farm just a mile and a half up the road. The group planned to examine the Native American Grist Mill located in the woods there. The mill is a local landmark known about for years and years by its owners. A description of the mill goes as follows, it is a bowl shaped circular depression, approximately 8" wide by 8" deep worn into a large, solid, sandstone rock during use with a stone pestle as the Native Americans ground acorns, hickory and walnut meat into meal for consumption and/or storage. Ken Burkett, club member and a field archeologist for the Carnegie Museum in Pittsburgh, studied the mill and declared it to be genuine and not a fake or natural depression in the rock. Ken then registered the mill with the state archives in PA. for the purpose of future location and protection.

Our group then entered the cars and drove on up Kramer Road and stopped near the intersection of Paradise Road. There Greg pointed out two original log homes, constructed some time during the mid 1800's. One once housed a Trithart family and the other was the home of Godfrey Trexler now occupied by a Nicholson Family. A trip to some of the more Eastern Counties of Pa, a casual observer may see a fair number of log structures but here in Jefferson County, these two are believed to be only two left.

Another interesting feature contained with in the Nicholson yard is the large Sassafras Tree still growing there. I was there 20+ years ago to attend a yard sale. I noticed the abnormally large tree so I immediately placed a tape measure about its girth, four and one half feet above the ground. The tape measure showed a whopping measurement of nearly 14 feet in circumference which translates to a diameter of almost four and a half feet! I shared the measurements and location with a Forester friend of mine, who's hobby is measuring very large trees. Well Dale Luthringer looked at the tree and guessed it is possibly the #3 champion for the state of PA.

Our group then assembled in the lower driveway of the Paradise Independent Church where I instructed the group to look beyond the cemetery and Big Run-Reynoldsville State Road where a very old farmstead, no longer recognized as such, lay. The proprietor was none other than Henry Bonnett, a late nineteenth century gun maker who farmed this land for the better part of a decade. Henry was one of about 22 gun makers active in Jefferson County at that time. One of our members reminded me that Henry was also a violin maker and I heard he panted oil pictures on canvas before moving on to Clarion PA. then Brookville PA.

A few members of the group became quite interested in some of the tombstones contained within the church cemetery. One in particular was a tall, square, spire that appeared to be made of an aluminum alloy belonging to Jacob Smith (1813- !8887) and his wife. Ken Burkett pointed out that similar markers were available from retailers such as Sears and Roebuck at one time. The markers could be custom ordered and came disassembled in a flat crate to be reassembled and installed at the grave site.

The group then proceeded to Spring Road where one of the two Eleanora coal mine shafts is situated near the cement bridge that spans Big Run creek. Greg gave a brief history of the documented side of the mine but there is an oral, undocumented side of the history known only to a extremely small group of historians.

I was somewhere around the age of 12 years old when my paternal grandfather, the late Wade D. Peace (1901-1976), told a haunting tale of intrigue and mystery, when the two 185 ft deep shafts were to be dug; around 1892, Twenty seven African Americans were brought in from an unknown location, to dig the shafts. Wade was not born for another 9 years so I can only surmise the story was passed on to him by someone who was there.

Digging a mine shaft then was an extremely, dusty, dirty and dangerous job (too dangerous for white men at the time) and so the African Americans were turned loose. Wade said the shaft diggers stayed in a company house up the hill along Native Road, just beyond the intersection of Skarbek Road. I remember quizzing my mother quite aggressively as to how could 27 men all live in one house at the same time? My mother came back with an answer of logic, she replied perhaps the men worked two shifts. Now that I an older her answer makes much more sense to me and working round the clock makes the most sense; coal equals profit, the labor of digging a shaft to get to the coal, not so much so speed was everything.

Back to the African Americans, I highly doubt if there is anything in print about their existence, so we know absolutely nothing about their personal life; who they were or their families, What we can surmise about them is that they were young, strong and they were surely capable; but what they were not was immune, for at some point in their tenure they came down with the dreaded smallpox virus and died, everyone of them. The big question is what became of their bodies? Were they sent back to their homes or were they interred somewhere nearby, or were they moved to an intermediate place of burial. Over the years this question has puzzled me something fierce, so whenever I had the chance I would question any old timers that I happened to run across; some were vaguely aware of the tale but not a one had an answer. The answer alluded myself for forty years until the History of Henderson Township was published and a man in his nineties came forward to report the bodies of the shaft diggers were in deed buried somewhere nearby, but the exact location, the man had no clue.

At this time Ken Burkett, our field archeologist, was called back to his home in Summerville to receive some unexpected company so our tour was close to grinding to a halt of some nearby, related sites. To go on without Ken seamed pointless at this time. Our group was a hearty bunch of souls and someone expressed an eager desire to press onto the next site which was a probable Native American Rock Shelter located beyond the town of Wishaw. Having visited this shelter six weeks earlier I naturally took the lead but, after seeing no familiar land marks I pushed on for 45 minuets more but was soon floundering in the wilderness. I began to feel a lot like Moses of the Bible as he led the Hebrew people from Egypt by way of a wilderness for forty years. At this point our group was becoming quite disillusioned until one Dan Sorg of St Mary's, stepped up and volunteered to go 200 yards further ahead, across a deep rocky hollow and then; success! Dave called his girl Chrissy of Kersey with the good news. The group moved on to the rock shelter, which was a large one for this area. I would say the shelter was 8 to 9 feet deep under a sandstone ledge, about 30 ft or so wide and high enough to stand erect in most places. Nearly all members poured under the rock ledge and into the shelter so they could experience cave living first hand. After a number of pictures were snapped and some extensive searching for

an early rumored date carved into the rock, the group headed for the cars.

Getting home, 2 different ladies told me how much fun they had. We need to get Ken Burkett back to examine the rock shelter and the grave site of the African Americans. I predict another field outing will be needed perhaps in the spring.

This is not the Christmas season I expected. After traveling so much this summer and fall, I was already behind on tasks. Then, this December, good friends offered to paint the remaining walls in my house that I had not gotten to (about 80% of my walls!). It was an amazing offer, and I said "Yes!" After pulling things away from my walls and packing up, they swooped in and painted it all in three days.

Now my house is a total disaster zone. I can't find daily items, I have no Christmas decorations, and I cannot find my Christmas cards. This is going to take a lot more time to clean and put things away than it did to tear down and pack up.

And yet, I am trying to enter this Advent Season daily to make room for Jesus in a new way. It is HARD. So many tasks, distractions, stuff, and even emotions vie for my time and attention.

At the same time, I have been writing stories about young men and women in the military coming to Jesus:

In 2024, the Parris Island team was averaging 1,500 to 1,600 Marine recruits attending Bible study each week. "Our largest Sunday this past summer was 3,493," missionary Paul Little said. "We had 531 recruits attend from one company. That's incredible because that company is made up of only 660 recruits! I've never seen attendance like that before."

All I could think of when hearing about those young Marines coming to meet with Jesus each week is: "Wise men still seek Him."


Then I read the story about the Wise Men reading the signs and coming to meet the New King Jesus. They traveled more than 400 miles in danger and hardship.

While I was in Mongolia this summer, I met with the leaders of the Army and Border Troops and the second-in-command of the Air Force. I explained how a mission could work and help their children. Every division of the Mongolian Armed Forces was in! They offered help receiving and storing the container and offering a facility for the event.

When I came home, Unto offered us wheelchairs. But all the shipping costs would have to be paid by Cru Military. Well, there are no funds available for that. But I can't let this project die. I offered to work to raise the money for the container and for the purchase of tools and supplies we need to truly fit the wheelchairs to the children properly.

I pray that God says YES and provides all the funds needed to ship this container so we can GO to Mongolia, minister to children and families, and open doors for the Gospel! Will you join me in prayer?

## It's not just a child's wheelchair ...

It's the gift of significance when they often feel left out. It is a gift of hope when they often feel hopeless. And best of all, it is an unforgettable expression of God's love. They feel the love of someone who is thinking about them and cares enough to send a wheelchair across the miles.

Cru Military is working to give the handicapped children of military families in Mongolia that gift of significance, hope, and love.

For just \$200, Cru Military can ship a wheelchair to Mongolia. Then, in 2025, we will take a team of physical therapists and wheelchair mechanics to personally fit the wheelchair to the child of a military family. The Mongolian Cru Military team (called Centurions) will do all the follow-up with each family, building relationships and sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ.

In a country less than 2% Christian, the Cru missionaries there know they have a great task to make sure everyone has the chance to know and follow Jesus. The Centurions are focusing on the military community of 50,000 active-

duty men and women and their families-a closed society hard to access.

But after meeting with leaders in the military, the Centurions have support from all branches of the Mongolian armed forces to bring this medical mission to minister to children.

Now, the Centurions need help. We need to ship 150 wheelchairs to Mongolia plus supplies to adapt the chairs properly. Would you please pray that God will give us more than enough funds to ship 150 wheelchairs as well as supplies? If we get additional funds, we will ship even more wheelchairs (up to 225!) to help even more children! So please pray for God to abundantly provide!


Would you consider giving \$200 to give one chair to a child in Mongolia? Or could you give more than one chair? Or give a part of a wheelchair?


We would also love to take a letter from you for each chair you provide—letting that child know who loved them so much that they would give such a great gift from the other side of the world!

### Project MonGOlia

#### Q: Why do they need these wheelchairs?

A: Being in the Mongolian Military is not a highpaying job. Most families cannot afford a wheelchair for their handicapped children. So they carry them from place to place, or they stay home because it is easier. With a wheelchair, they can be free to go to more places as a family.

#### Q: Can I give for part of a wheelchair?

A: Yes! We can combine all the donations to ship wheelchairs. And please write a letter to a child!

#### Q: Who can go on this mission trip?

A: We need physical therapists and wheelchair mechanics first and foremost. And since the team will be very small, we will need a few support team members as well. If you are interested in going, please email joey.payne@crumilitary.org to be added to the interest list. The trip will be in October 2025.

#### Q: I'd like to write a letter to the child that will receive my wheelchair. What do I say?

A: Even though we can't share the Gospel directly in our letters because of the nuanced situation in Mongolia and the sensitive nature of our partnership with local military officials (they have asked us not to do any religious activities like public prayer or evangelism), you can talk about your life, your faith, and how God's love lead you to help them and bless them with the wheelchair. And add a photo! That makes you even more real! (We can provide a sample letter, just ask.)

#### Q: How will you share the Gospel with the children and their families?

A: After the event, the Centurions missionaries will be visiting the children and their families in their homes to see how they are doing, to make sure the wheelchairs are functioning properly, to build relationships, and to answer any questions they have. In this home setting, there is more freedom to talk about faith in Jesus.
