

The secretary's report was approved as read with a motion from Bobbi and a second from Bob, and the treasurer's report was reviewed and approved with a motion from Wendy and a second from Brooke.

## VISITATION COMMITTEE

This is a committee we had many years ago. I remembered Barry Fillman saying it was a big help to him as the Pastor. I even called him to see if he remembered the committee and he indeed did. He also said it meant a lot to people that we visited. It is enjoyable for those being visited and the teams visiting.

The way the committee worked was we had a book with names of those to visit, elderly, those having health issues. We had people that were on the book much of the time, also short term surgeries, health issues, etc. We were constantly adding to the book and taking those off that were no longer needing visits. Anyone can make additions if they know of someone that may appreciate a visit. It does not have to be a member, someone in the neighborhood may be included.

We went out as a team (2 people) you could pick your teammate. The team would have the book for a week and commit to visit at least I person (more if you had time) that week. You would write in the book who you visited and the date, that way we would not be visiting the same people. You are free to visit those you know best and would be more comfortable visiting. At the end of the week you would give the book to the next team listed in the book. If you had a reason that week would not be good, you can exchange with another team. It is probably a good idea to contact people before you visit as they may have appointments, etc.

If we have enough interest, it could be weeks or even months before the date you would have the book and need to visit again. We think of our shut-ins, those that cannot get out much because of physical problems, we pray for them, but many are lonely and would enjoy company. We enjoy going to Church on Sunday and just visiting with friends and it is nice for people to know that the people they talked to in church haven't forgotten them.

During the greeting time in Church it gets rather loud and you can tell the people could talk a lot longer. Ha! We enjoy each other!

My Grandpa was the late Willis H. Strouse (1895-1968). Willis owned and worked a farm in the Paradise Section of Winslow Township along the now named Blose Hill Road and situated directly across the road where Marty Strouse has a motorcycle repair shop.

Grandpa related a story to me about an incident he experienced as a young, adult man. This particular day, Grandpa observed four teenaged boys in his apple orchard, which lay below his house. The boys had picked a quantity of fresh apples and were now stuffing them into their shirts. Well Grandpa being a farmer, who made his living from the sale of farm products, could not tolerate the theft of his apples so he arranged to intercept the boys and catch them "Red Handed".

Grandpa described a long ditch that ran near the orchard and angled up to the township road. When the boys emerged from the ditch onto the road, Grandpa was right there to apprehend them! Grandpa was described as a man that possessed extra ordinary strength but how he was able to corral four, fleet, footed boys, I know not how. Perhaps the boys were more respectful in those times or Grandpa had his hands on one or two of the boys, he never said.

Grandpa then led the four boys down the road a good distance to an access door on the ground floor of his barn. When Grandpa built the barn, he had constructed a doubled chambered, concrete cistern on the house side of the barn hill for domestic water. On the other side of the hill Grandpa had made a root cellar to store potatoes, carrots and apples during the long winters. Grandpa then opened the door of the root cellar, placed the four boys within, then closed and locked the door behind them, thus, imprisoning the boys.

A few hours later, Grandpa returned to the root cellar to find four very scared boys with tears streaming down their faces. At this point Grandpa decided the boys had been punished enough and subsequently turned them loose with their promise to never return to his farm again. Well the boys must have had enough for they all tore up the road just as fast as they could run toward their home in Sykesville. Grandpa described the one boy as being African American, about a head taller than the others, with very long legs so he soon pulled a considerable distance ahead of the other boys. It must have been quite a spectacle to see those boys run up the road the way that they did for Grandpa was still laughing about it 50 years later.

## Grandpa's Justice (continued)

A couple of weeks later when Grandpa was in Sykesville where he happened to cross paths with the father of one of the apple-stealing boys, Grandpa gave the father an earful about their poor behavior and judgement and that he needed to evoke some sort of punishment to prevent future devilment and behavior. The father told Grandpa in very broken English, "No got good place to pen them up like you do!", then Grandpa laughed again.

If you enjoyed this true tale and think that it would be a great gag to play on your neighbor; then think again. Intentional imprisonment of your fellow man may carry sever and harsh penalties.


The children learned that in the Bible, Jesus wasn't only talking to the people who were in the moment with Him, He speaks to us and wants us to:
